THE COLLEGE:

The healthcare system in India requires a large number of qualified healthcare professionals to meet the prescribed norms laid down by the World Health Organization (WHO) for serving the Indian population. Considering the growing demands of health professionals in the country, the College of Nursing was established in 2008, to prepare professional nurses with basic and advanced competencies in nursing practice, education, administration, and research.

MGM New Bombay College of Nursing offers Under graduate, Post graduate and doctoral programs in Nursing with realistic and successful access to higher education. In the year 2016, the Union Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, launched a competency based M.Sc. Nurse Practitioner in Critical Care (NPCC), Post graduate Programme, the College of Nursing is one among the pioneering institutes in India for starting the NPCC program. It further expanded in 2024 by introducing the M.Sc. Nurse Practitioner in Emergency and Trauma care (NPETC). Adding to its accolades, the Indian Nursing Council (INC), in collaboration with the University of Houston, Texas, officially launched the India's first-ever Doctorate in Nursing Practice (DNP) program in October 2024. MGM New Bombay College of Nursing under MGM Institute of Health Sciences is the first in India for this groundbreaking initiative of starting DNP Program.

The college is self-paced with basic and advanced learning resources, well-equipped classrooms, nursing laboratories, administrative offices, student lounges and a library with latest reference materials and online facilities.

The nursing students graduating from MGM find a wide range of opportunities for higher education within the campus. Upon successful completion of B.Sc. Nursing, those who intend to continue their studies can opt for M. Sc. Nursing, M.Sc. (NPCC), M.Sc. (NPETC) and Doctoral programs in Nursing from the same institution. Nursing graduates can also choose Post graduate courses in Biomedical Sciences, hospital management, health care and public health management from MGM Institute of Health Sciences Navi Mumbai. Objectives of Programs offered;

1. Demonstrate competency in providing comprehensive nursing care based on problem solving approach in the hospital and community. Participate as members of health team in the promotive, preventive, curative and restorative health care delivery system.
2. Demonstrate leadership qualities and function effectively as nurse educator and Manager.
3. Demonstrate clinical competence / expertise in providing critical care which includes diagnostic reasoning, complex monitoring and therapies. Identify the critical conditions using differential diagnosis and carry out interventions to stabilize and restore patient's health and minimize or manage complications independently.
4. Demonstrate skills in conducting research significant to national importance and interpreting the findings. Develop and test theories relevant to nursing and disseminate results of theory development and research.

1) B.Sc. NURSING

Eligibility Criteria:

1. The minimum age for admission shall be 17 years on 31st December of the year in which admission is sought. The maximum age limit for admission shall be 35 years.
2. Minimum Educational Qualification
 - a) Candidate with Science who have passed the qualifying 12th Standard examination (10+2) and must have obtained a minimum of 45% marks in Physics, Chemistry and Biology taken together. The candidate must have pass marks in English.
 - b) Candidates are also eligible from State Open School recognized by State Government and National Institute of Open School (NIOS) recognized by Central Government having Science subjects and English only.
 - c) English is a compulsory subject in 10+2 for being eligible for admission to B.Sc. (Nursing).
3. Colour blind candidates are eligible provided that colour corrective contact lens and spectacles are worn by such candidates.
4. Candidate shall be medically fit.
5. Married candidates are also eligible for admission.
6. Students shall be admitted once in a year.
7. Merit based on Entrance examination conducted by MGMIHS

2) POST BASIC B.Sc. NURSING

Eligibility Criteria:

1. Passed the Higher Secondary or Senior Secondary or Intermediate or 10+2 or an equivalent examination from a recognized board.
2. General Nursing and Midwifery and registered as R.N.R.M. with the State Nurses Registration Council.
3. Equivalency of foreign nursing qualification from Indian Nursing Council in case GNM from Foreign countries.
4. Colour blind candidates are eligible provided that colour corrective contact lens and spectacles are worn by such candidates.
5. Candidate shall be medically fit.
6. Married candidates are also eligible for admission.
7. Students shall be admitted once in a year.

3) M.Sc. NURSING

Eligibility Criteria:

1. The candidate should be a Registered Nurse and Registered midwife of equivalent with any State Nursing Registration Council.
2. The Minimum education requirements shall be the passing of: B.Sc. Nursing / B.Sc. Hons. Nursing / Post Basic B.Sc. Nursing with minimum of 55% aggregate marks from an institution recognized by Indian Nursing Council.
3. Minimum one year of work experience after Basic B.Sc. Nursing or Minimum one year of work experience prior or after Post Basic B.Sc. Nursing, from a recognized hospital of minimum 100 bedded capacity or a community health setup or a recognized nursing educational institution.
4. Candidate shall be medically fit.
5. Merit based on Entrance examination conducted by MGMIHS.

4) NURSE PRACTITIONER IN CRITICAL CARE (NPCC) & NURSE PRACTITIONER IN EMERGENCY AND TRAUMA CARE (NPETC)

Eligibility Criteria:

1. Must have undergone the B.Sc. Nursing in an institution recognized by the Indian Nursing Council.
2. The applicant must be a registered B.Sc. Nurse, with State Nursing Council and have minimum of one-year clinical experience, preferably in any critical care setting prior to enrollment.
3. Must have scored not less than 55% aggregate marks in the B.Sc. Nursing program.
4. Selection will be based on the merit of an entrance examination and interview held by the competent authority.

PhD NURSING

Eligibility:

A candidate who has passed a M.Phil. (Nursing) or Master of Science Degree examination in Nursing from a recognized university with a minimum of **60%** marks in aggregate, have **03 years** teaching or clinical experience after M.Sc. (Nursing) and working in Teaching institution/Hospital/Community Center/Nursing Department within University jurisdiction.

Duration of the Programme:

Full time: Three years, maximum of 6 years.

Part time: Five years.

A candidate can register for Ph.D. course on part time basis. The candidate should complete research work and submit the thesis to the University within five years from the date of provisional registration. Maximum period for submission of thesis will be Six years from the date of provisional registration subject to the approval from the Board of Research Studies/Doctoral Studies on the recommendations of the guide. There will be no provision for further extension of the period.

Under extraordinary circumstances, affecting a student warranting extension of period for submission of thesis, the student should submit an application to the Registrar (Evaluation) through the guide who will refer the same to the Board of Research Studies/Doctoral Studies for its opinion, which will be submitted to the High-Power Committee. The decision of the Vice Chancellor in the matter shall be final.

Common Entrance Test for PhD Nursing:

Selection for the Ph.D. Program will be based on merit by entrance with minimum 60% marks for the candidates belonging to open Category. A relaxation of 5% marks from 60% to 55% is allowed to those belonging to SC/ST/OBC (non -creamy layer) differently -able and other categories of candidates.

Under extraordinary circumstances, affecting a student warranting extension of period for submission of EBP project, the student should submit an application to the Registrar (Evaluation) through the guide who will refer the same to the Board of Research Studies/Doctoral Studies for its opinion, which will be submitted to the High-Power Committee. The decision of the Vice Chancellor in the matter shall be final.

Criteria for Selection:

Selection for the DNP Program will be based on merit either by entrance or by M.Sc (NPCC) examination marks with minimum 60% marks.

RAGGING

The Supreme Court defined ragging in the Vishwa Jagriti matter (1999) as, “Any disorderly conduct whether by words spoken or written or by an act which has the effect of teasing, treating or handling with rudeness to any other student, indulging in rowdy or undisciplined activities which causes or is likely to cause annoyance, hardship or psychological harm or to raise fear or apprehension thereof in a fresher or a junior student or asking the students to do any act or perform something which such student will not in the ordinary course and which has the effect of causing or generating a sense of shame or embarrassment so as to adversely affect the physique or psyche of a fresher or a junior student.”

UGC has notified the 3'd Amendment in UGC Regulations on 29th June, 2016 to expand the definition of ragging by including the following;

Any act of physical or mental abuse (including bullying and exclusion) targeted at another student (fresher or otherwise) on the ground of colour, race, religion, caste, ethnicity, gender (including transgender), sexual orientation, appearance, nationality, regional origins, linguistic identity, place of birth, place of residence or economic background.

WHAT CONSTITUTES RAGGING

Ragging constitutes one or more of any of the following acts:

- a) Any conduct by any student or students whether by words spoken or written or by an act which has the effect of teasing, treating or handling with rudeness a fresher or any other student.
- b) Indulging in rowdy or undisciplined activities by any student or students which causes or is likely to cause annoyance, hardship, physical or psychological harm or to raise fear or apprehension thereof in any fresher or any other student.
- c) Asking any student to do any act which such student will not in the ordinary course do and which has the effect of causing or generating a sense of shame, or torment or embarrassment so as to adversely affect the physique or psyche of such fresher or any other student.
- d) Any act by a senior student that prevents, disrupts or disturbs the regular academic activity of any other student or a fresher.
- e) Exploiting the services of a fresher or any other student for completing the academic tasks assigned to an individual or a group of students.
- f) Any act of financial extortion or forceful expenditure burden put on a fresher or any other student by students.
- g) Any act of physical abuse including all variants of it: sexual abuse, homosexual assaults, stripping, forcing obscene and lewd acts, gestures, causing bodily harm or any other danger to health or person.
- h) Any act or abuse by spoken words, emails, post, public insults which would also include deriving perverted pleasure, vicarious or sadistic thrill from actively or passively participating in the discomfiture to fresher or any other student.
- i) Any act that affects the mental health and self-confidence of a fresher or any other student with or without an intent to derive a sadistic pleasure or showing off power, authority or superiority by a student over any fresher.
- j) Any act of physical or mental abuse (including bullying and exclusion) targeted at another student (fresher or otherwise) on the ground of colour, race, religion, caste, ethnicity, gender (including transgender), sexual orientation, appearance, nationality, regional origins, linguistic identity, place of birth, place of residence or economic background.

ADMINISTRATIVE ACTION IN THE EVENT OF RAGGING

The institution shall punish a student found guilty of ragging. The Anti-Ragging Committee of the Institution shall take an appropriate decision, in regard to punishment or otherwise, depending on the facts of each incident of ragging and nature and gravity of the incident of ragging established in the recommendations of the Anti-Ragging Squad.

- i. Suspension from attending classes and academic privileges.
- ii. Withholding/ withdrawing scholarship/ fellowship and other benefits.
- iii. Debaring from appearing in any test/ examination or other evaluation process.
- iv. Withholding results.
- v. Debaring from representing the institution in any regional, national or international meet, tournament, youth festival, etc.
- vi. Suspension/ expulsion from the hostel.
- vii. Cancellation of admission.
- viii. Rustication from the institution for period ranging from one to four semesters.
- ix. Expulsion from the institution and consequent debaring from admission to any other institution for a specified period. Provided that where the persons committing or abetting the act of ragging are not identified, the institution shall resort to collective punishment.

University Grants Commission has set up a toll free Helpline for dealing with Ragging. Any victim of ragging can ring up **the toll free number 18001805522** or send an email to : helpline@antiragging.in The helpline will be operational 24 hours. Immediate action will be taken within fifteen minutes by alerting appropriate authorities, be it the head of the educational institution, the district collector or the police.

Every student studying in the college and his/her parents/ guardians shall provide the specific affidavit required as per the UGC regulations. It is mandatory for every student and his/her parents to submit an anti-ragging affidavit at the time of first admission and there after each year at the time of annual registration.

The Anti ragging committee to responsible for inculcating a culture of ragging free environment in the campus. The anti-ragging squad is responsible for keeping a vigil and stop the incidences of ragging. The students in distress due to ragging related incidences (if any) can contact the Anti-ragging committee immediately.
